From the Board of Trustees

Whenever possible, WHCRL put its discoveries into the public domain so that all other researchers could access and freely use the data and resources developed by WHCRL to accomplish the only objectives of importance: preventing and curing cancer."

Dr. Bey contributed to both the research at Wood Hudson and to our efforts in student education, such as the Summer Undergraduate Research Education Program (UREP). Dr. Bey has accepted the board's appointment as an Adjunct Sr. Scientist and will continue to work with us on scientific publications and other scientific matters. He offered the following comments:

"Although my time at Wood Hudson Cancer Research Laboratory was brief, it was a wonderful opportunity to work with undergraduate research students in cancer biology. I am currently a postdoctoral researcher at NKU in Dr. Erin Strome's lab, where I continue to work closely with undergraduate students. Our research focuses on the function of two proteins, homologs of which have been linked to multiple cancer types in human cells, specifically examining how altered expression or function of these proteins can lead to adverse effects on genome stability."
